Anglican Colleges and Universities hold historic first meeting

Archbishop of Canterbury heralds "bright vision"

Christ Church College, Canterbury, was the site of the founding conference which launched Colleges and Universities of the Anglican Communion. The new worldwide association will include all institutions of higher education which have historic Anglican roots and ties. Almost 100 institutions of higher education around the globe have been identified; 47 were represented at Canterbury.

The four day conference was spent in planning, mutual sharing, identifying programs and institutional needs, and finally, in an exciting climax, the voting on a series of resolutions which brought the new organization into existence.

Eleven nations—Canada, Hong Kong, India, Jamaica, Japan, Liberia, the Philippines, Taiwan, Uganda, the United Kingdom (including Wales), and the United States—were represented. The delegate of an Anglican College in Ireland, who had planned to attend, remained at home in Dublin to participate in a demonstration for peace following a serious incident which escalated the Irish/English conflict. That, together with the concern for the fate of Cuttington University College in Liberia which, at the time of the Conference, was the target of bombing in the devastating civil war, gave special meaning to the Conference theme, Forward in Partnership: Church Colleges Addressing the Global Agenda into the 21st Century.

One question asked throughout was, "How can our Church Colleges around the world work collaboratively on behalf of colleagues and institutions facing a crisis?" The Conference voted, as the first official act of CUAC, for a resolution to support Cuttington in every possible way and to urge the U.N., through Sir Paul Reeves, the official Anglican Communion observer to the U.N., to further peace efforts in Liberia. In a keynote address, which all agreed was an intellectual tour de force,

the Rt. Rev. Neville de Souza, Bishop of Jamaica and Chair of the Board of Trustees of Church Teachers College in Jamaica, reminded the 141 Conference participants that changing loci of power and spheres of influence is God's way; that CUAC must recognize such change and not merely seek to preserve the status quo.







The Rev. Canon John C. Powers has joined the staff as Director of Special Projects. A graduate of General Theological Seminary, he was rector of Trinity Church, Tulsa, for fourteen years, and was formerly on the Board of the AEC.

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
